As the temperature increases, so does the traffic on our waterways. A boating trip could turn into a disaster in the absence of a responsible operator. Just as with operating a motor vehicle, operating a boat requires a sober and attentive driver.

New Jersey law provides, "No person shall operate a vessel on the waters of this State while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, a narcotic, hallucinogenic, or habit-producing drug or with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.08% or more by weight of alcohol." NJ Rev Stat § 12:7-46 (2022).

Anyone who violates the statute will face similar penalties had they been convicted of driving a motor vehicle under the influence. Depending on your BAC (blood alcohol content) not only could you have your boating privileges revoked for a year for a first offense, but you may also lose your motor vehicle driving privileges for a period of 3 months. Second and Third offenses carry increasingly severe penalties.

After conviction of operating under the influence, a person must also complete a boating safety course approved by the Superintendent of State Police, which shall be completed prior to restoration of the privilege to operate a vessel.

It is increasingly common to suffer from a mental health injury in association with an auto accident, fall or other personal injuries and you can absolutely be compensated for that injury. These types of injuries are compensable whether a physical injury is present or not.

The most important thing is that you can prove your injury to a jury. If you make a claim for an injury to your mental health, just as you would in the case of a physical injury, you must have a doctor willing to testify to your injury. Moreover, a doctor must be able to show causation between the event that you are claiming caused your injury and your injury. Essentially, to demonstrate a mental injury you must be able to prove it the same way that you would a physical injury in order to be entitled to compensation. It's important to always seek the advice of an experienced personal injury attorney, as they will be able to evaluate your case and determine if you have a compensable claim.

#### BOOZING AND BOATING COULD LAND YOU IN HOT WATER

Can the police compel me submit to a breath test if they suspect I am impaired while operating my boat?

Yes, if a person operates a power vessel or a vessel which is 12 feet or greater in length on the tidal or non-tidal waters of NJ consent for a breath test is implied. This consent allows law enforcement to the take breath samples for the purpose of making chemical tests to determine the content of alcohol in their blood. However, the officer must have reasonable grounds to believe that the person has been operating a vessel in violation of NJ law.

#### What if I refuse a breath test?

Like operating a motor vehicle, if after being arrested for a violation of operating under the influence the person refuses to submit to the breath test, a judge shall revoke the right of a person to operate their boat. Penalties of refusal are like those if the person was convicted of driving under the influence.



Be smart and safe this summer by always designating a driver, whether you are on the road or on the water.
